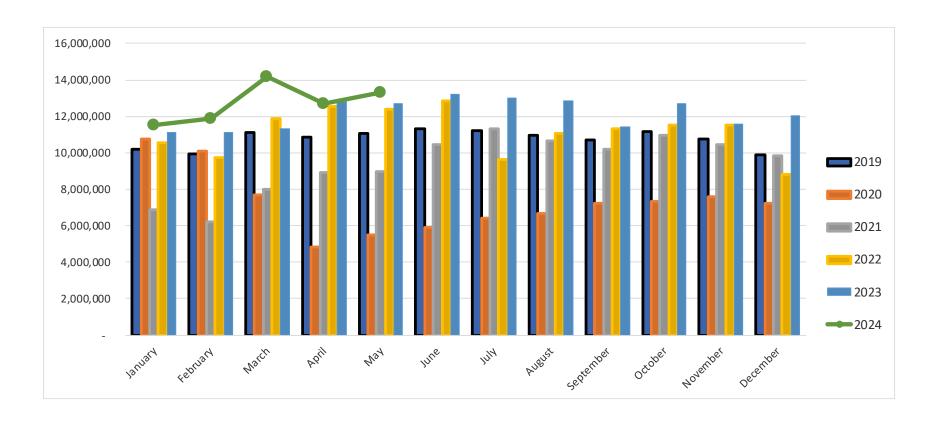

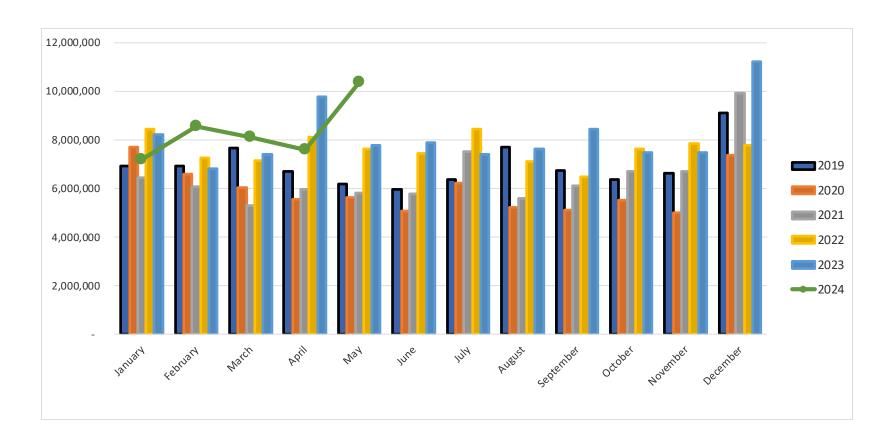


Operating Revenue



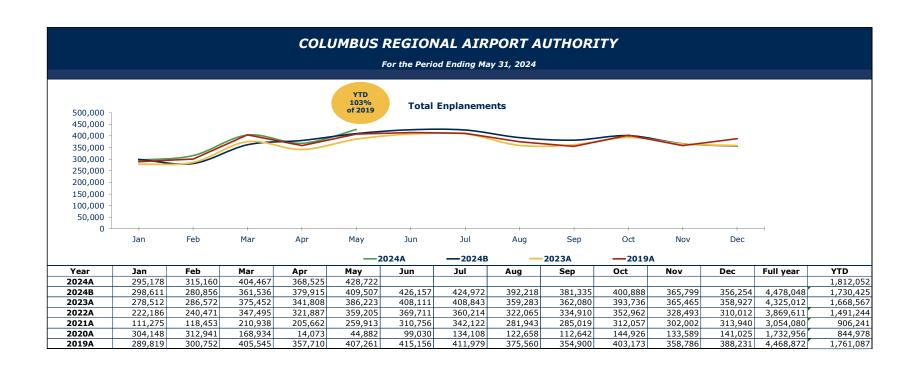


Operating Expenses

MANAGEMENT COMMENTS

CURRENT YEAR BUDGET VARIANCE:

REVENUE

Total Operating Revenue has a favorable budget variance of \$3,934.

CARGO AIRLINE - (\$377)

The unfavorable variance is due to lower aircraft landed weights and cargo volumes at LCK.

OTHER AERONAUTICAL - (\$389)

The unfavorable variance is due to lower than forecasted lease revenue, use fees and FBO fuel sales offset by an increase in fueling fees and access control fees.

PARKING - \$2,756

The favorable variance is driven by higher volume of passengers utilizing the Garage, Blue Lot, Red Lot and Green Lot than forecasted.

GROUND TRANSPORTATION - \$751

The favorable variance is due to higher than forecasted transactions for transportation network companies and rental cars.

CONCESSION- \$406

The favorable variance is due to higher than forecasted advertising & marketing, food and beverage income, passenger security screening fees and retail concessions.

HOTEL- \$164

The favorable variance is due to higher occupancy rates at the hotels.

OTHER NON-AERONAUTICAL - \$703

The favorable variance is due to higher than forecasted non-aeronautical Facility and Ground leases.

EXPENSES

Total Operating Expenses have a favorable budget variance of \$1,382.

EMPLOYEE WAGES & BENEFITS - \$1,671

The favorable variance is due to higher than forecasted vacancies and lower than expected health insurance costs versus the budget.

MATERIALS & SUPPLIES - \$882

The favorable variance is due to a decrease in snow supplies, fuel and office furniture, equipment & tools (<25,000).

PURCHASE OF SERVICES - (\$1,168)

The unfavorable variance is due to higher than forecasted contracted services, software maintenance, and utilities & telecommunications offset by repairs & maintenance, business conferences & employee training, and inspections & licenses.

ACTUAL CURRENT YEAR VS. PRIOR YEAR

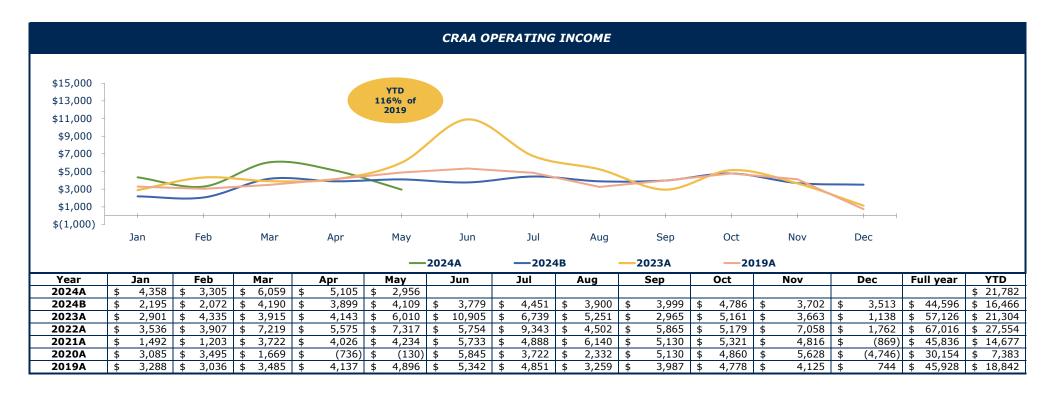
2024 Revenue exceeded 2023 Revenue by \$4,514 and 2024 Expenses were higher than 2023 Expenses by \$1,868.

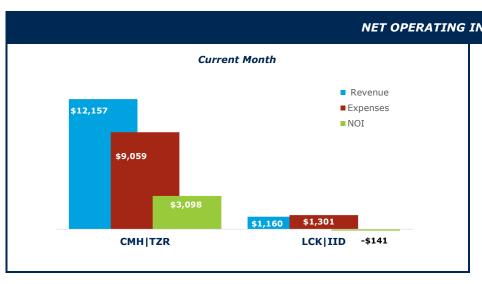
An increase in the number of enplanements from prior year has increased parking revenues. Expenses have increased primarily due to contracted services, software maintenance and utilities & telecommunications.

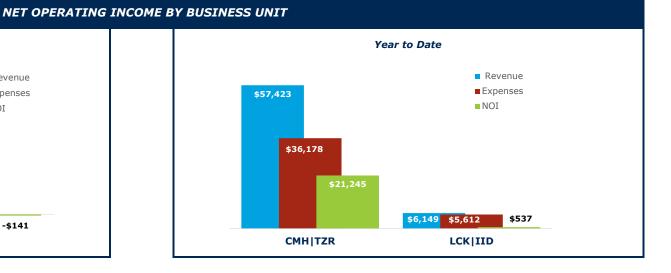
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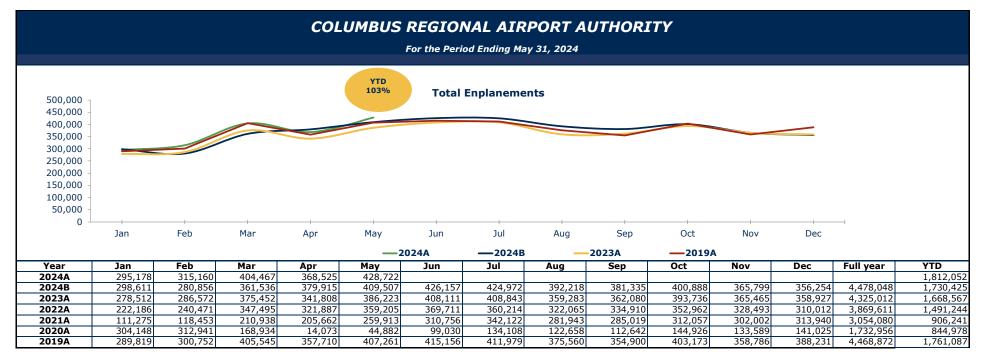

= record-breaking month

Travel trends

May was the busiest month ever for passengers at John Glenn Columbus International and the Rickenbacker passenger terminal. During the month 423,397 enplanements, or 834,408 total passengers, traveled through these airports. This total passenger volume was up 8.9% yearover-year and 0.4% over the previous busiest month of July 2019.

This activity is in advance of an expected record-breaking summer. with more than three million seats scheduled for passengers to depart and arrive from these airports from June through August.

Three flights were launched in June, each receiving a water cannon salute. Those newest nonstop routes include Salt Lake City with Delta (launched June 8), the new Southwest service to Kansas City (launched June 9), and San Diego (launched June 8).

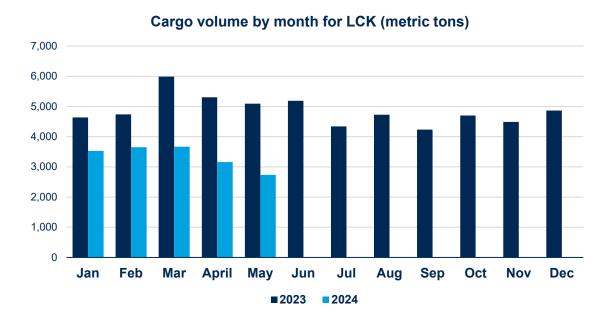


New flights to Dallas, Boston

Spirit Airlines announced new flights from CMH to Dallas/Ft. Worth, operating four times a week beginning July 10. This is the fifth route added by Spirit this summer, resulting in double the seats the airline has scheduled out of CMH year-over-year.

American Airlines announced an additional frequency from CMH to Boston. The route will increase to three times daily beginning September 4, 2024.

Cargo air service



Cargo activity

- May cargo volume was down 27.7% from the year prior and down 31.4% year-to-date
- May cargo operations were down 32.3% from the year prior and down 29.6% year-todate

Air cargo

The air cargo environment at Rickenbacker remains unchanged from the prior report. Automotive charters out of Mexico and Central America are anchoring international service, averaging three times per week. Indications from industry partners point to a possible late Q3 or Q4 resumption of Asia-Pacific traffic, market forces dependent.



Rickenbacker Logistics and Economic Development Forum

On Friday, June 14, in conjunction with the Columbus Air Show, CRAA hosted a logistics and development update. Around 50 attendees from the air cargo industry, real estate development, and elected and economic development officials participated in a program highlighting the area's growth in logistics and the future opportunities in and around Rickenbacker. Featured speakers included Congressman Steve Stivers, current President & CEO of the Ohio Chamber of Commerce, Airforwarders Association Executive Director Brandon Fried, and Air

National Guard Command. Rickenbacker partners at Forward Corporation (formerly Forward Air) and their logistics subsidiary Omni also provided a brief on their strategic direction to make Rickenbacker a North American hub for international air transport and domestic on-forwarding.

Concessions

BrewDog's first U.S. airport bar lands at CMH

On May 15, BrewDog opened in CMH's Concourse B near gate B20. Along with the company's popular IPAs like "Elvis Juice," visitors to the 16-seat counter bar can also have non-alcoholic brews and a menu featuring specials like the giant soft pretzel, buffalo chicken bites, and classic cheeseburger.



Customer Experience

Tuskegee Airmen Mural arrives at Rickenbacker

A CRAA Airfield Maintenance Supervisor suggested expanding the Tuskegee Airmen monument at LCK. An employee committee was formed, and they chose local artist Adam Hernandez out of 25 artist submissions to paint this CRAA-commissioned mural. The artwork was completed just in time for the Columbus Air Show. The mural honors this World War II fighter group that was stationed at Lockbourne Army Air Base (now known as Rickenbacker) between 1946-1949.



Operations

2024 Columbus Air Show

An estimated 45,000 people attended the three-day show, headlined by the U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds. It was a well-executed event with very few challenges beyond the extreme heat. Many jurisdictions collaborated on this event, including the City of Columbus police, Columbus Public Health, Franklin County Sheriff, Emergency Management Agency, City of Groveport police and building safety, Madison Township, Hamilton Township, Village of Lockbourne, and the 121st Air National Guard..



Community events

Columbus LGBTQ+ Pride March

A dedicated group of CRAA employees led by Lindsay O'Connor, Senior Communications Specialist, organized, planned, and invited airport employees and partners to join in CRAA's first year in the Stonewall Columbus Pride Festival and March. About 35 airport employees, friends, and family participated and distributed "Fly With Pride" luggage tags to the paradegoers.



Government affairs

Central Ohio Defense Group's day on the Hill

On behalf of the Columbus Regional Airport Authority, Kristen Easterday, Director of Communications & Public Affairs, joined other regional partners in Washington, D.C., on June 11. The Central Ohio Defense Group met with both House and Senate offices to advocate for the needs of the region's defense assets. The meetings included requests of support for two items that impact Rickenbacker International Airport and CRAA's adjacent property - the Small Arms Firing Range additional funding request within the National Defense Authorization Act and the Defense Community Infrastructure Program 2024 grant application for improvements on the inside runway.



One-Time Strategic Community Investment Fund

The Ohio Senate released its selection of projects for the One-Time Strategic Community Investment Fund (OTSCIF), a \$700 million unique, one-time fund established under the state's current operating budget, passed by the Ohio General Assembly in June 2023. The Senate's announcement comes three months after the House sent over its one-time fund appropriations. Within the Senate's allocation, \$7.5 million was designated for the new terminal at John Glenn Columbus International Airport. The final bill must still be approved and signed by the governor. Legislative leadership has shared that negotiations between the House and Senate are going well. The capital appropriations are expected to pass both chambers and head to the governor's desk by the end of June.

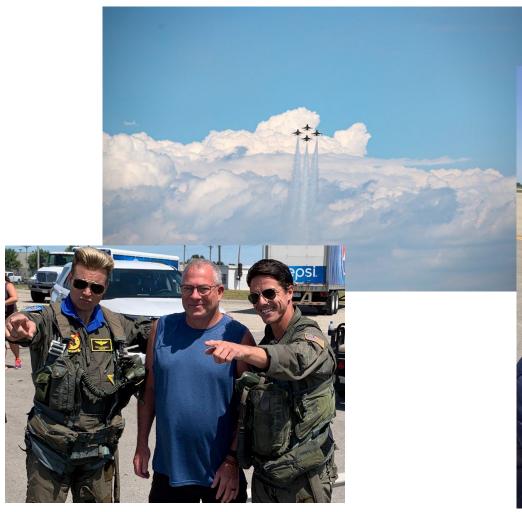

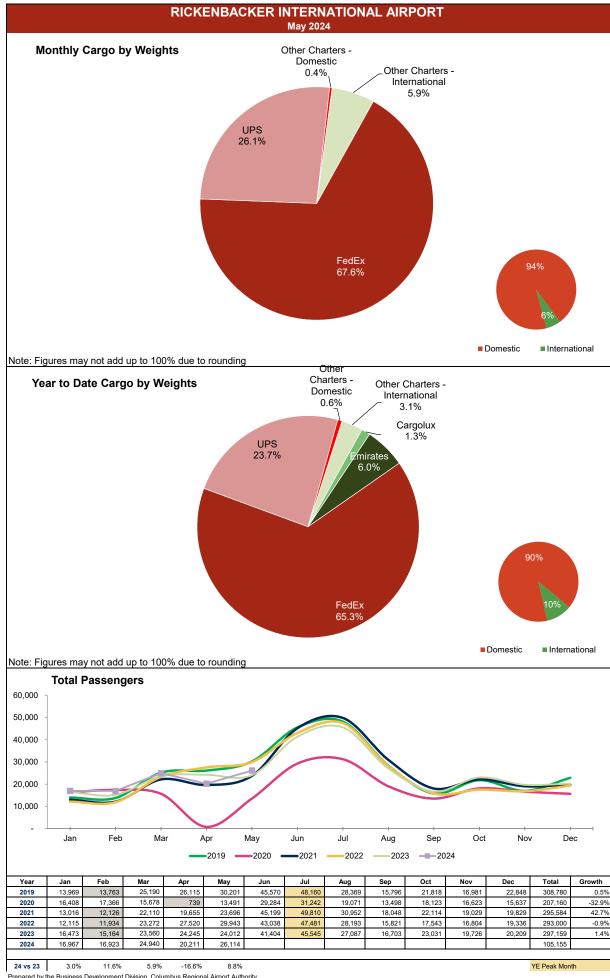

A RESOLUTION TO ENTER INTO A DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION COORDINATION SERVICES AGREEMENT IN THE AMOUNT OF \$4,997,170.00 WITH LANE AVIATION CORPORATION FOR THE REMOVAL AND REPLACEMENT OF UNDERGROUND FUEL TANKS WITH ABOVE GROUND FUEL TANKS AT JOHN GLENN COLUMBUS INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT.

RESOLVED, To enter into a Design and Construction Coordination Services Agreement in the amount of \$4,997,170.00 with Lane Aviation Corporation (Lane) for the removal and replacement of underground fuel tanks with above ground fuel tanks at John Glenn Columbus International Airport (CMH).

Background: The commercial Jet A and AvGas fuel farm at CMH consists of just under one (1) million gallons of fuel storage contained in 22 tanks, 20 of which are underground. Two (2) additional tanks containing diesel and unleaded gasoline are also located underground. The underground tanks currently in place range in age from 49 to 66 years old. Concern for both continued structural integrity and increasing capacity needs necessitates their removal and replacement with appropriately sized aboveground tanks. The fuel farm supports all airlines serving CMH and is critical to both daily operations and the Columbus Regional Airport Authority's (CRAA) long-term growth.

The fuel farm was an amalgamation of multiple tracts of land and leases, some of which pre-dated the creation of CRAA as an independent port authority. Between 2019 and 2021, the business terms of those leases were the subject of litigation between CRAA and Lane. Resolved through mediation and subsequent execution of purchase and operation agreements in 2021, the two (2) agreements provided for CRAA's clear ownership and control of the fuel farm assets, Lane's responsibility for existing environmental conditions and future remediation, the framework for the removal, remediation, and replacement of all underground storage tanks (to be initiated by this Resolution), and Lane's continued operation and maintenance of the fuel farm during such work.

This Resolution authorizes Lane to design, build, and finance the removal of all underground tanks and to replace them with above ground tanks.

The cost of the installation of the new, above ground tanks, and the cost of the removal of the existing underground tanks will be funded with CRAA Cash allocated in future budgets.

Lane Aviation is an un-certified woman-owned business and recently celebrated its 89th anniversary at CMH.

CRAA staff recommends Board approval of Resolution 22-2024.

RESOLVED, To authorize funding in an amount of \$4,800,521.00 for Professional Design Services Agreement #ENG-2023-068, with Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. (KHA), for on-call engineering services including services associated with Project #22024, Rickenbacker International Airport Ramp #3 Reconstruction Phase 4, Project #22122, New Terminal Apron South Taxilane at John Glenn Columbus International Airport, Projects # 24010, 24011, and 24012, Pavement Management Program (PMP) Update 2024/2025 at John Glenn Columbus International Airport (CMH), Rickenbacker International Airport (LCK), and Bolton Field Airport (TZR), and Project #24061, New Terminal Remain Overnight (RON) Apron Taxilane.

Background: Pursuant to a Request for Qualifications issued by the Columbus Regional Airport Authority (CRAA) on December 18, 2023, KHA was selected through the required qualifications-based selection process to provide professional airfield civil engineering and pavement management program update services. CRAA entered into Professional Design Services Agreement, ENG-2023-068 for on-call engineering design and PMP update services with KHA on April 30, 2024.

Project #22024 – Ramp #3 Reconstruction Phase 4 at LCK is the final phase to facilitate unrestricted air cargo operations at existing Air Cargo Terminal (ACT) #5 and planned ACT #6. The improvements will include an extension of the existing in-ground jet fueling system.

Project #22122 – The current terminal at CMH opened on September 21, 1958. The age of the existing facility and related infrastructure, combined with a current terminal capacity of 10 million annual passengers and the need to prepare for the future, necessitates construction of a new terminal. An aircraft apron and taxilanes are necessary to serve the new terminal and connect to existing taxiway infrastructure. The south taxilane and a portion of the apron were split off from the overall civil site plan to follow federal requirements for utilization of Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) funding through the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). The task order for construction phase engineering services includes construction administration services, construction observation, quality assurance testing, record plan preparation, and surveying to comply with FAA Airports Geographic Information System (AGIS) submission requirements.

RESOLUTION 26-2024

Projects # 24010, 24011, and 24012 – Federal regulations require airports to implement and maintain a PMP to receive FAA grant funds. The PMP provides a uniform method for tracking and forecasting pavement conditions for maintenance and rehabilitations to prolong pavement life and aid in planning and budgeting projects. The FAA recommends that the PMP be updated every three (3) years. The last PMP update was in 2021/2022. KHA and their subconsultant Pavement Technical Solutions, Inc. (PTS) will perform pavement evaluations in July and August 2024 on airside and landside pavements at CMH, LCK and TZR. The PMP update of all three (3) airports will be completed by February 2025.

Project #24061 – During the engineering and architectural design of the New Terminal Apron and Taxilanes it was determined that additional Remain Overnight (RON) aircraft parking spaces would be needed. The existing Concourse A Terminal Apron and Taxilane was identified as the most suitable space. For aircraft to move between the New Terminal and this remote parking spot without tower coordination, a taxilane needs to be extended along the south side of the Lane Aviation apron.

Project #22024 (LCK Ramp #3, Ph. 4) is included in the 2024 Capital Budget and funded 5% from CRAA Cash Reserves, 5% from the State of Ohio Department of Transportation (DOT), and 90% from an anticipated FY25 Airport Infrastructure Grant (AIG) funded through the BIL.

Project #22122 (Terminal Apron South Taxilane) is included in the 2024 Capital Budget and funded 25% from Debt Service/CRAA Cash Reserves, and 75% from an anticipated FY24 AIG funded through BIL.

Project #24010 (PMP CMH) is included in the 2024 Capital Budget and funded 25% from CRAA Cash Reserves, and 75% from an anticipated FY25 Airport Improvement Program (AIP) grant.

Project #24011 (PMP LCK) is included in the 2024 Capital Budget and funded 5% from CRAA Cash Reserves, 5% from the State of Ohio DOT, and 90% from an anticipated FY25 AIP grant.

Project #24012 (PMP TZR) is included in the 2024 Capital Budget and funded 5% from CRAA Cash Reserves, 5% from the State of Ohio DOT, and 90% from an anticipated FY25 AIP grant.

Project #24061 (CMH RON) is included in the 2024 Capital Budget and funded 20% from Passenger Facility Charges, 5% from the State of Ohio DOT, and 75% from an anticipated FY25 AIP grant.

CRAA values the importance of diversity and inclusion. Based upon the scopes of services to be performed under this task order, KHA has committed to a Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) goal of 67.7% for Project #22122, and 6% for Project #'s 24010, 24011, and 24012. Background: The current terminal at CMH opened on September 21,1958. The age of the existing facility and related infrastructure, combined with a current terminal capacity of 10 million annual passengers and the need to prepare for the future, necessitates construction of a new terminal. An aircraft apron and taxilanes are necessary to serve the terminal and connect to existing taxiway infrastructure. The scope of work for the project includes pavement milling and demolition, asphalt paving, stormwater improvements including oil/water separators, airfield lighting improvements, and pavement markings.

The engineer's estimate for construction is \$70,346,000. The following responsive and responsible bids were received:

The Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) goal for this project is 15%. Shelly & Sands has committed to 15.48% DBE participation and has identified Soils Testing & Engineering Ltd., M.S. Trucking, Inc., PKBN Hauling LLC, Eaton Construction Co., Inc., John K. Leohner Co., Inc., Beagle Hill Services LLC, Global Aviation Distribution LLC, and Torres Electrical Supply and Sales, LLC as their DBE partners.

RESOLVED, To authorize a construction contract in the amount of \$896,990.00 with Shelly and Sands, Inc. (Shelly and Sands) for Project #23079, Future Hangar Development at Bolton Field Airport (Project).

Background: In anticipation of future growth at Bolton Field Airport (TZR), the Columbus Regional Airport Authority (CRAA) is preparing a site for up to four (4) 10,000 square foot corporate hangars. The base bid of the project will construct a new taxilane to provide access to the first two (2) hangars with an additive alternate to extend the taxilane for all four (4) future hangars. The total contract amount for the base bid amount of \$896,990.00 will be funded as follows: approximately \$736,000 from an anticipated FY24 Airport Infrastructure Grant (AIG) funded through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) and 10% from CRAA Cash Reserves. The remaining amount will be funded approximately 90% through Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Nonprimary Entitlements, 5% from an anticipated Ohio Department of Transportation matching grant, and 5% from CRAA Reserves. The Project is included in the 2024 Capital Budget.

The Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) goal for this Project is 15%. Shelly & Sands, Inc. has committed to 23.5% DBE participation and has identified Soil Testing & Engineering, Ltd., MS Trucking, Inc., and John K. Leohner Co., Inc. as their DBE partners.

Background: The current terminal at CMH opened on September 21, 1958. The age of the existing facility and related infrastructure, combined with a current terminal capacity of 10 million annual passengers and the need to prepare for the future, necessitates construction of a new terminal.

Contracts to engage an Architect/Engineer and other professional services for the Project were approved by the Board in 2022, with design services commencing in May 2022. Resolutions approving a contract with Hensel Phelps as the Construction Manager at Risk for the Project and prior GMP Amendments are as follows:

GMP Amendment #3 includes funding for landside civil improvements consisting of on-grade roadways, elevated roadways, and the earthwork associated with them. Additionally, funding for site electrical, roadway signage, pavement markings, underground utilities such as storm drainage, sanitary sewer, and waterline connections, and preconstruction efforts to support the metal wall panel installation and field engineering and quality control engineering for the remainder of the Project is also included. GMP Amendment #3 will bring the total Board authorization to \$431,589,414.00.

GMP Amendment #3 will be funded from CRAA Cash Reserves and/or Debt Services. Subsequent GMP amendments for additional phases of the Project will be submitted to the Board of Directors for approval.

CRAA values the importance of diversity and inclusion. As such, Hensel Phelps has targeted an overall Diversity Business Partner (DBP) participation of 25% during the construction phase of the Project and is projecting a 29.29% DBP participation through GMP #3.
